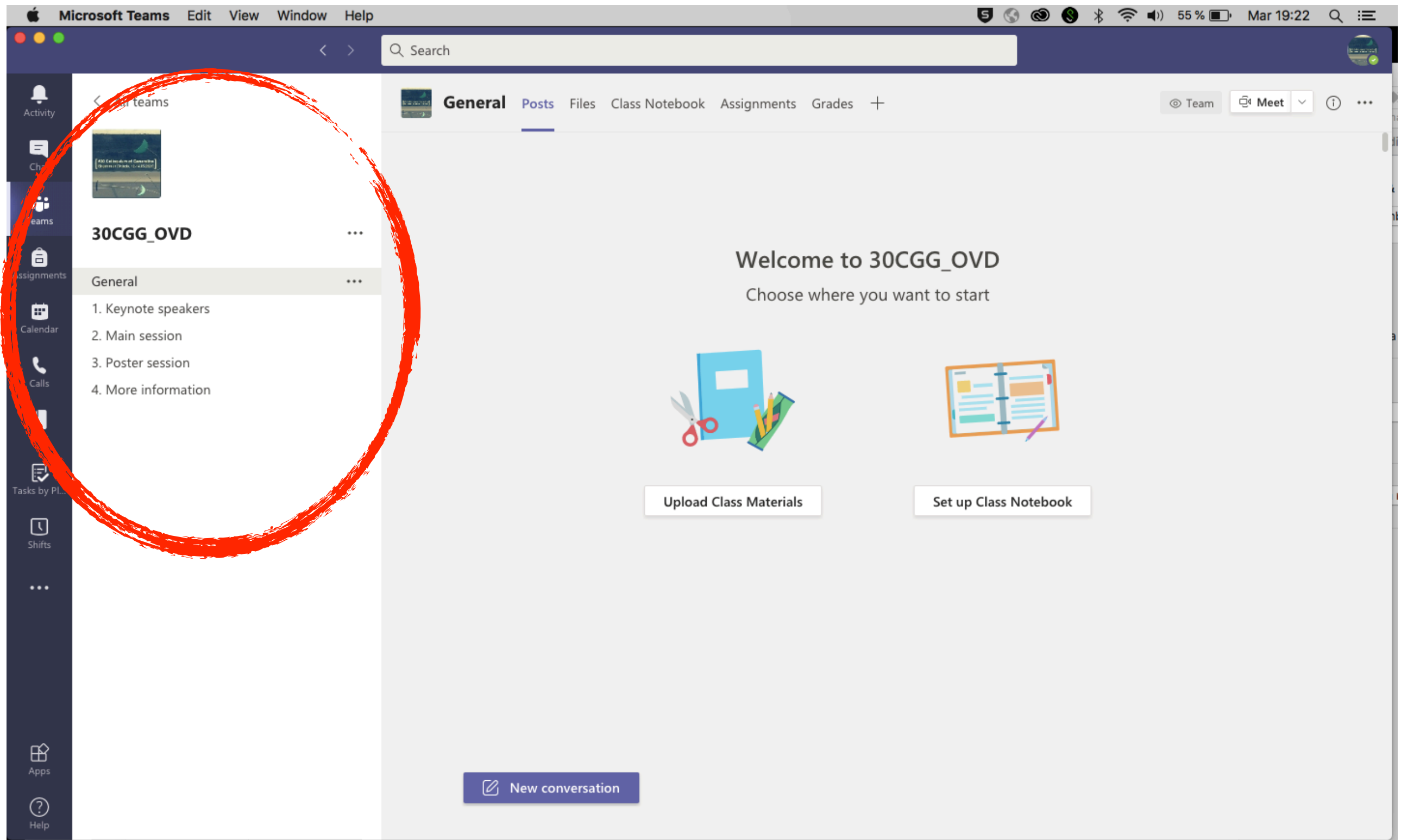
How is 30CGG_OVD
