
# How is 30CGG\_OVD organized

- 4. More information, where you can access information about the city of Oviedo, the Principality of Asturias, the University of Oviedo and more





- Posters are organized in two successive groups. Each poster has its own Meeting in channel 3. Poster session




Session (Live event) announcement and access


